HEALTH SERVICES:

ABORIGINAL DIABETES INITIATIVE (ADI)

ADI supports Type 2 Diabetes prevention and provides education, lifestyle planning, health promotion, screening and care management initiatives that are community-based and culturally appropriate.

ABORIGINAL MENTAL HEALTH LIAISON

The Aboriginal Mental Health Liaison assists Aboriginal adults to access mental health services and crisis counseling services, and is available to all self-identifying Aboriginal people in the Fraser Valley.

ABORIGINAL SUICIDE AND CRISIS INTERVENTION RESPONSE TEAM (ASCIRT)

The ASCIRT team trains and organizes community-based teams to provide suicide prevention, intervention and postvention services, particularly for youth.

ABORIGINAL SUPPORTED CHILD DEVELOPMENT (ASCD) / ABORIGINAL INFANT DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM (AIDP) (SHXWT'AM:ETSEL)

ASCD (works with children 4-12 years old) and AIDP (works with children 0-3 years old) are family centered programs open to Aboriginal children and parents. The programs provide culturally-appropriate services to infants and children who have or may be at risk for developmental delays.

ADULT IN-HOME CARE (AIHC)

The AIHC program provides homemaking and assistance with personal care and meal preparation. Clients are mainly Elders, but can also be those with physical or cognitive limitations. Services are provided to people residing in one of our member communities.

The Á:lmèlháwtxw Early Education Centre is open to children from all backgrounds and provides programming that encourages children to learn through play.

- **Day Care Services:** for children 0-5 years old
- **Head Start Preschool:** for children 3-4 years old
- **Head Start Family Program:** Programming for Aboriginal families with children 0-6 years old and is provided both on-site and through in-home appointments.

COMMUNITY HEALTH

Community Health promotes public health initiatives and disease prevention. Services include: immunization clinics, prenatal and postnatal family health, Baby Time Drop-In, community workshops and health education, healthy eating, HIV/Aids education, assisting community members with Medical Service Plan (MSP) applications, providing Non-insured Health Benefits information, and referrals to other services.

FAMILY EMPOWERMENT TEAM- XYÓLHMETTSEL SYÉMYEM

A three-year home visitation program for women in their childbearing years who use or are at risk of using drugs and/or alcohol. Assists participants: with setting and achieving personal goals, obtaining drug and/or alcohol treatment, choosing a family planning method, improving a child's health and keeping up to date with age appropriate medical appointments, connecting with services, transportation to appointments, resolving systemic barriers and providing support with housing and child custody issues.

HOME AND COMMUNITY CARE (HCC)

HCC nursing is offered to on-reserve community members and includes assessment, planning and evaluating professional nursing care for clients with acute, chronic or palliative care needs.

MENTORSHIP PROGRAM

Building 18 - 7201 Vedder Rd, Chilliwack

Provides support services to youth 12-19 years of age who have been identified as having challenges in school, and/or who are involved in the youth justice system, and/or have substance abuse or mental health issues.

Referrals are made through School District 33 or the Ministry of Children and Family Development (MCFD).

The Indian Registry Administrator provides registration services which includes births, deaths, marriages, divorces, transfers, adoptions to 14 Stó:lō Bands.

EMPLOYMENT SERVICES

In partnership with Service Canada, Stó:lō Aboriginal Skills & Employment Training (SASET) provides Aboriginal employment and training services to a catchment area that extends from Surrey to Boston Bar and the three communities of Lower Stl'atl'imx Tribal Council of Skatin, Samahquam and Xa'xtsa. We serve First Nations status/non-status, on/off-reserve and Inuit individuals, regardless of origin in Canada if they reside in our catchment area.

SASET provides weekly outreach to 18 First Nations and one day a week at WorkBC offices in Mission, Abbotsford, Chilliwack, Agassiz and Hope and one day a week at the Mission Friendship Centre.

Employment services include, but are not limited to: employment and career counseling, essential skills assessments and skills building, career decision making, education and trades training information, job posting board, computer and internet access, individualized career action plans, job search strategies, resume/cover letter development and interview skills.

SASET provides certificate training that meets labour market employment outcomes. Under or un-employed individuals can apply for financial supports for up to 12 months training and transition to work, which can include work gear, transportation, etc.

SASET also funds community-based employment and training needs: Work Place Based Training, Student Employment Placements, Direct Course Purchases and Targeted Wage Subsidies.

CULTURAL EDUCATION AND TOURS

Cultural Education includes Steqó:ye and the Longhouse Education Program (LEP). SRRMC staff deliver the Steqó:ye Program in school to students in K-12. Schools, university students, professionals and others visit the Coqualeetza Longhouse and Shxwt'a:selhawtxw (The House of Long Ago and Today) to learn about Stó:lō history and culture through the LEP.

CULTURAL HERITAGE AND ARCHAEOLOGY

FISHERIES

Working with the Lower Fraser Fisheries Alliance, the SRRMC's Fishery Manager provides culturally appropriate knowledge to support fisheries management in the Lower Fraser. The Stó:lō Nation Fisheries Management Board is supported by the Fishery Manager.

GIS – GEOGRAPHIC INFORMATION SYSTEMS

The SRRMC-GIS department uses up-to-date software to link scientific and community based knowledge in projects including: cultural use studies; archaeological work; place names; cultural inventories; and cultural land management.

LAND USE PLANNING

The SRRMC administers and facilitates the continued development of the S'ólh Téméxw Use Plan, a regional-scale land use plan that represents Stó:lō cultural values across S'ólh Téméxw (Stó:lō traditional territory). The Land Use Planning department provides support for referrals processing, development of best management practices, cultural resource management, treaty-related lands analyses, and natural resource and environmental management.

LIBRARY AND ARCHIVES

The Stó:lō Library and Archives houses collections that focus specifically on Stó:lō and more generally on the Coast Salish.
